

Domestic Violence Awareness Month

WHEREAS, the goals of National Domestic Violence Awareness Month are to celebrate the strength of battered partners and children and to connect advocates across the nation working to end family violence; and

WHEREAS, domestic violence is a vicious cycle that includes the use of physical, emotional, sexual, and psychological abuse which affects women, men, and children of all racial, social, religious, ethnic, and economic groups as well as society as a whole; and

WHEREAS, our first responders, victim assistance staff, and volunteers renew their commitment to provide services for domestic violence victims and their families while ensuring that they are treated with respect and compassion; and

WHEREAS, more than 4.4 million physical assaults are committed against women by an acquaintance annually in the United States and in Arizona 74 Domestic Violence related deaths occurred in the year 2005; and

WHEREAS, studies have found that child abuse occurs in up to 70% of families that experience domestic violence. In addition, thousands of children witness domestic violence and witnessing violence is a risk factor for physical and mental health problems as well as becoming a victim or a perpetrator of domestic violence.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Elaine M. Scruggs, Mayor of the city of Glendale, Arizona, on behalf of the City Council, do hereby proclaim the month of October 2006, as

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH

and call upon the citizens of Glendale to increase their understanding of domestic violence and be supportive of their family, friends, neighbors, and co-workers who may be a victim of an abusive relationship
