Bulk Trash Talk and Tips

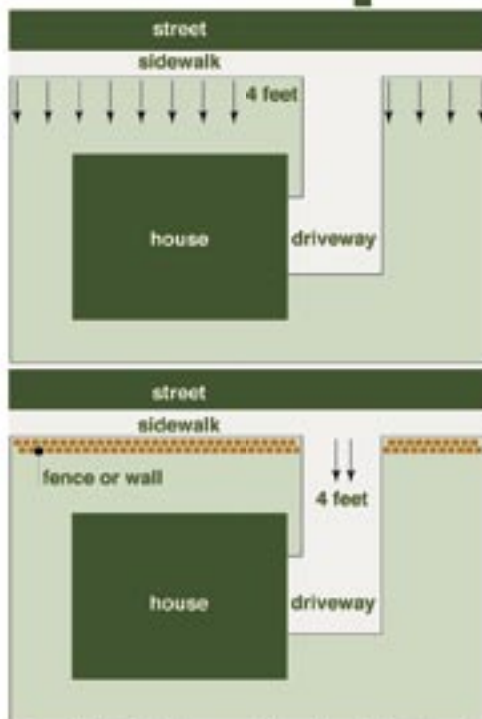
The city of Glendale provides monthly bulk trash collection service for large, bulky items that do not fit into your residential garbage container. Items such as tree limbs and brush, as well as furniture and appliances are collected and disposed of at the city's landfill.

In an effort to reduce blight and assist in keeping our neighborhoods safe, you are asked to place bulk trash out no earlier than 6 a.m. on the Thursday before your scheduled service week and no later than 6 a.m. on the Monday of your scheduled service week.

It is a violation of city ordinance to put bulk trash out before or after the assigned period. Residents that do not place bulk trash out on time may not receive service until the following month and are required to remove their items from the street or alley until the next scheduled service. Failure to comply may result in enforcement action, including charges to the resident.

When setting these items out, it is required that piles are stacked neatly and placed parallel to the street. Bulk trash items should be separated by category, such as appliances, tree limbs and furniture.

Glendale sanitation crews are responsible for the removal of large debris only. The equipment used to remove large debris often leaves behind smaller debris, falling on the property owner to collect and remove. Service will not be provided if bulk trash is improperly placed, deemed unsafe to collect or contains unacceptable items or hazardous materials.



Place bulk trash piles no farther than 4 feet toward your home from sidewalk's edge. If you have a fence or wall, place bulk trash on or your driveway.



Bulk Trash Tips

- Do not place bulk trash on or within 2 feet of garbage or recycling containers, water meters, cable boxes, fire hydrants, block walls or other fixed objects.
- Items placed out for collection cannot exceed 4 feet in length, except for bulk items (for example, a couch).
- Keep glass separate from other items in small, sturdy cardboard boxes and clearly labeled. Boxes should be 2 feet square or smaller.
- Do not place whole tree trunks or stumps out for collection.
- Refrigerators must have doors, hinges, lids and latches removed.
- Do not put garbage out for bulk trash collection.

Keeping Glendale Green

The city of Glendale owns and operates its own landfill and receives more than 295,000 tons of garbage from households and businesses annually. Specially constructed for effectively disposing of garbage, Glendale's landfill uses the 'cell method' where waste is deposited in small areas, compacted and then covered daily.

Glendale residents living in single-family dwellings and duplexes are encouraged to dispose of extra yard waste, trash and appliances at the city's landfill and are eligible to receive a discounted rate. Residents may dispose of up to 1 ton of self-hauled trash (excluding Freon containing appliances) at no charge and may make unlimited visits. Trash exceeding 1 ton in a single trip is

prorated. A resident delivering 1.5 tons would be charged only for the .5 ton exceeding the one ton limit.

To qualify for the discounted rate, present a valid driver's license or photo ID as well as a current Glendale utility bill. All trash, delivered to the landfill by a resident, must originate from the resident's own property.

The Glendale landfill is open Monday-Friday 7:30 a.m.-4 p.m., Saturday 7 a.m.-3 p.m. and is closed on Sundays and official city holidays. For additional information on the city of Glendale landfill, call 623.930.2191 or visit www.glendaleaz.com.

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In the Business of Picking Up

The city of Glendale offers a variety of residential and commercial sanitation services from weekly curbside garbage and recycling collection to monthly bulk trash collection. In addition, the city owns and operates the landfill and the Materials Recovery Facility, where recyclable materials are sorted and prepared for sale.

Household garbage and yard trimmings should be placed in plastic bags and securely tied before being deposited into the garbage container. All accepted recyclables may be loose and mixed in the recycling container.

The commercial collection service offers roll-off containers to homeowners in need of larger containers for big household or home improvement projects.

Bulk trash collection is available monthly for the collection of large items that will not fit into the garbage container. Included in bulk trash collection are items such as tree limbs and brush, furniture and appliances. All bulk trash must originate from personal property.

The Materials Recovery Facility receives recyclable materials from households and businesses and processes them into marketable goods. The sorting process combines automated material handling technology with manual labor.

Glendale Helps You Dispose of Hazards in Your Home



What did you do with that nearly empty bottle of pool chemicals - toss it in your garbage container? We hope not! Many household products contain hazardous ingredients that can be harmful when discarded incorrectly. Improper disposal of these products can pose a threat to human health and also pollute the environment.

Materials that are considered hazardous and are prohibited in your garbage container include antifreeze and automotive products like car batteries, motor oil and filters, flammables, oil-based paint, pesticides and pool chemicals.

Water-based (latex) paint may be disposed of with regular household garbage as long as there is no remaining liquid. To get rid of paint, add an absorbent material and let dry completely. The empty, dried-out can may be put into a plastic bag, securely tied and thrown away.

Most auto repair shops will recycle your used motor oil and see to proper

disposal of other automotive products. Locate auto repair shops, gas stations and other businesses that dispose of or recycle used motor oil and filters, antifreeze and car batteries.

Residential quantities of pool chemicals are accepted at the city's landfill although the chemicals must first be declared to city personnel upon entry.

Glendale makes it easy for residents to safely dispose of hazardous materials with home collection service during the Annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection event in the spring. Residents must schedule an appointment to arrange for pickup of material. In 2005,

the Sanitation Division provided service to 750 households.

Frustrate the Fly

Bagging and tying isn't just a good idea, it's a regulation monitored by the Maricopa County Health Department. Garbage, grass and other items placed in your garbage container may attract insects and cause unpleasant odors. Placing these items in securely tied plastic bags keeps your garbage container and the area around it clean.



Slow Down to Get Around

In an effort to reduce high-speed traffic around city vehicles, Glendale has adopted the Slow Down to Get Around campaign urging drivers to be cautious when maneuvering around city vehicles.

Decals on the back of Glendale's sanitation vehicles urge motorists to Slow Down to Get Around and to be careful when navigating around sanitation trucks and other large vehicles.

2006 Holiday Sanitation Collection Schedule

You can reduce your outdoor water use by 50 percent or more by installing xeriscape, low-water-use landscape. New homeowners who install a low-water-use landscape can receive a \$200 rebate from the city of Glendale Water Conservation Rebate Program. HOA's & Businesses Receive Up to \$3k

The city of Glendale Water Conservation Office is accepting applications for a non-residential landscape rebate program. Homeowner associations, multi-family properties and businesses are eligible to apply.

Applicants can receive up to \$3,000. To qualify for the cost-share rebate, interested organizations must complete an application, participate in the city's Water Budgeting Program and convert a minimum of 1,000 square-feet of grass to low-water-use landscaping. The

amount of the rebate is dependent on how much grass is converted.

"Through our Water Budgeting Program, we are helping homeowner associations save hundreds and sometimes thousands of dollars on their water bill. The new rebate program is particularly useful for older properties," said Jo Miller, Glendale's water conservation program manager. "The removal of unwanted grass not only reduces water bills and landscape maintenance costs, but also rejuvenates and updates old landscapes."

Did You Know...

When we conserve water, we preserve life. Water is a precious commodity in our desert community. Through careful planning and good water resource management, we have many water resources available to our city.

Where our water comes from:

- SRP – snow and rain run-off from the Salt and Verde River watersheds (in-state)
- CAP – run-off from the Colorado River (multi-state watershed)
- Groundwater – underground water pumped from wells
- Reclaimed water – treated, reused wastewater used for groundwater recharge and non-potable uses (landscape and golf course watering)

This diverse portfolio of available water is a great asset, but we must keep in mind that we live in a desert. A normal occurrence in our desert climate is the unpredictability and frequent cycles of drought and/or flood conditions. This makes water conservation a necessary way of life.

What the city is doing

- In June of 2004 the City Council approved a four-stage Drought Management Plan. The plan ensures that there are steps in place to actively manage our water supply during times of prolonged drought. The plan is available on the city's website at www.glendaleaz.com
- The West Area Reclamation Facility expanded capacity rating from 7 million gallons daily to 10 million gallons a day. The aquifer recharge area covers 20 acres and is designed to replenish groundwater supplies.
- The city's Right-Of-Way Division and Parks Department implemented new water conservation efforts and technologies resulting in a 15 percent water use reduction (conserving approximately 30 million gallons a year).
- The city reduced water usage by 7 percent from 2000 to 2004, even though the population has increased by over 25,000 additional residents during that time.

Spring Tune-up on Your Irrigation System

Now is a good time to check your irrigation system. Turn on each station and check for leaks, missing emitters, and grass heads that are over-spraying onto buildings, sidewalks, or streets. It is much easier to complete these routine fixes now than to wait until the temperature is above 100 degrees. Here are some March/April watering tips:

- Slow, deep irrigations are most effective. Make sure to soak the entire root zone to the appropriate depth; allow the soil to dry before watering.
- Bermuda lawns only need water once every 4 to 14 days. If you have a winter rye lawn, watering once every 3 to 7 days is sufficient. To determine the amount of time needed with each watering go to the easy-to-follow watering guide at wateruseitwisely.com or call the Water Conservation Office for a Landscape By the Numbers watering guide.
- Now is a good time to consider converting all or part of your water intensive plants to low-water-use plants that can save you time and money.

Suggested Spring Watering Schedule:

Plant	Frequency	Water Depth
Groundcovers (desert-adapted)	Every 14 - 30 days	8 - 12 inches
Shrubs (desert-adapted)	Every 14 - 30 days	18 - 24 inches
Mature trees (desert-adapted)	Every 14 - 30 days	24 - 36 inches
Mature trees (high water use)	Every 7 - 12 days	24 - 36 inches

These are general watering guidelines. You may need to adjust your frequencies to account for variations in climate or landscape conditions. For more information download easy-to-follow watering guide at wateruseitwisely.com or call the Water Conservation Office to obtain a watering guide.

Conserve Water Indoors Too

Water conservation not only helps save water, it will also save you money. The following tips can help you do your part to live a more water-wise lifestyle.

In the Bathroom

- Check faucets and pipes for leaks.
- Turn off the water while brushing your teeth or shaving.
- Limit showers to five minutes.
- For pre-1985 homes, replace standard shower-heads with low-volume heads. Install flow restrictors in bathroom faucets.
- Check your toilet periodically for leaks. Place a few drops of food coloring in the tank. After a few minutes, if you see color in the bowl, you have a leak.
- Listen for gurgling sounds coming from your toilet. These noises indicate the flush valve needs to be adjusted to stop wasting water.
- Avoid using your toilet for a wastebasket or ashtray. Extra flushes waste water and money.
- In pre-1980 homes, fill a plastic, one quart bottle with water and place it in the toilet tank. To anchor the bottle, partially fill it with sand or any heavy substance. This does not affect the efficiency of most toilets and can save 5 or more gallons per day per a family of four.

In the Kitchen & Laundry Room

- Automatic dishwashers and washers are more efficient if run

- only when they are full.
- When washing dishes by hand, don't let the tap run freely to rinse. Fill the second side of the sink with rinse water.
- Fill a pitcher with drinking water and store it in the refrigerator.
- When shopping for new appliances or plumbing fixtures, look for water-efficient products.

Monitor Monthly: Help Eliminate Water Waste

Did you know that summer outdoor water usage can be as high as 60 to 80 percent of your total bill? It makes sense to monitor your outdoor water system to make sure your water is not being wasted. A good time to do this is when you get your water bill. Here are some tips of what to look for:

- Broken grass sprinklers or risers – look for water spraying or bubbling from the grass head.
- Over-spray water – adjust sprinklers so they do not spray on sidewalks, driveways, walls, or buildings.
- Water in the valve box – an indication of a leaky valve needing repaired.
- Grass is too tall – if grass is too tall the pop-up sprinkler cannot spray above the height of the grass.
- A small hole or depression in the ground – indicating a leak.
- Mushrooms, molds or algae on the soil – shaded areas do not need as much water as sunny areas.
- Know where your anti-siphon assembly (also called vacuum breaker) is located. It not only protects your water supply from contamination, it is where you can shut off your irrigation system in emergency situations.
- Most important, adjust your timer/controller each month. Water long enough to get a deep penetration in the soil then you will not have to water as often.

Glendale's recycling program is one way for residents to help conserve natural resources and extend the life of the landfill by diverting recyclables out of the waste stream. Recycling is the process of collecting materials destined for disposal and reprocessing or remanufacturing them for further use.

Recyclables need to be clean, dry and empty. After finishing with a recyclable item, rinse as necessary to remove any food. There is no need to remove caps or labels, but please remove non-recyclable items like plastic cereal box inserts.

Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to run a television set for three hours. In five years, Glendale has recycled enough aluminum cans to generate savings to run one television continuously for 26 years.

When the container is at least half full, roll it to the curb on your regular weekly collection day for pickup. Containers must be out for service by 6 a.m. on collection day and returned to private property by 6 a.m. the following morning.

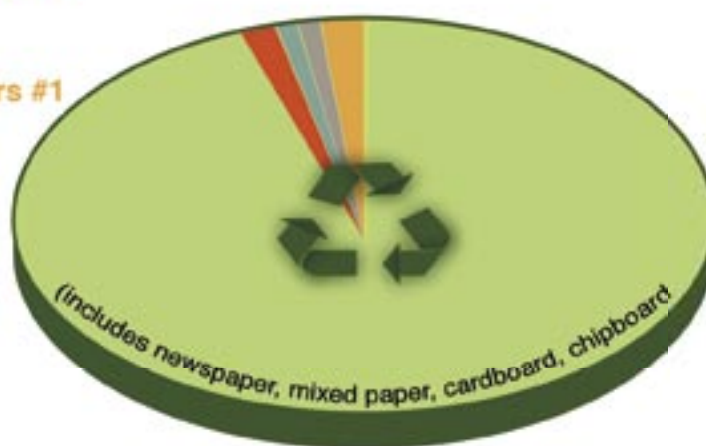

Contamination

Contamination is placing anything other than specified recyclable materials into the recycling container.

Crews will not service recycling containers that contain items unacceptable for recycling. The container may be left at the curb and marked with a tag explaining why it was not collected. After correcting the problem, set the container out the next recycling collection day.



Inspections

Sanitation inspectors perform field inspection work to monitor compliance with sanitation rules and regulations. Garbage containers are inspected to make sure the contents are bagged and tied and recycling containers are inspected to make sure only specified residential recyclable materials are present. Inspectors are available to answer your questions by telephone or in person. Call the Sanitation Division at 623.930.2660.



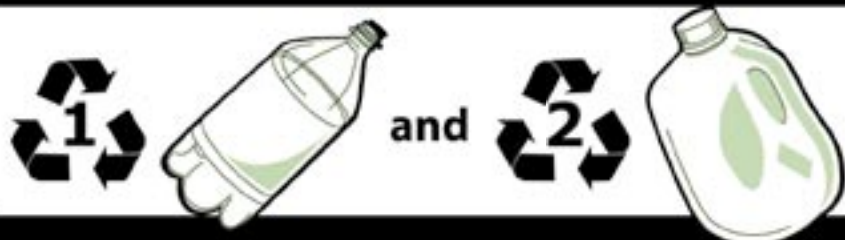

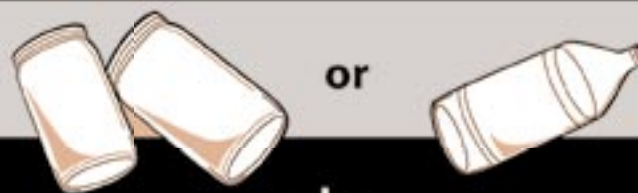

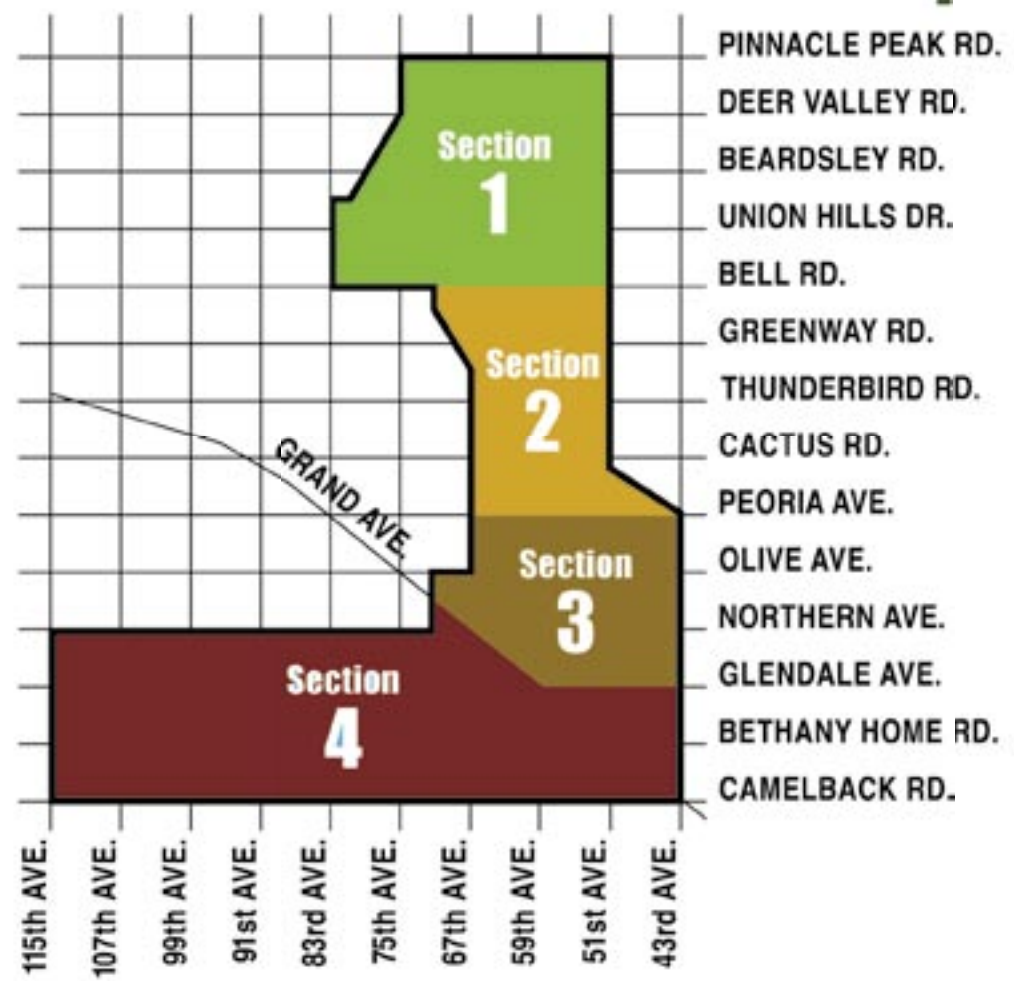
