Household Hazardous Waste Schedule Spring 2022

Dispose of unwanted household hazardous waste products by scheduling an at-home pickup between February 21 and March 18. An itemized list is needed, so please have that ready when you call to schedule your appointment. The actual collections will be handled March 14 through April 1. Call the Solid Waste Division at 623-930-2660 to make your appointment.

Hazardous materials that will be accepted include paints and wood stains, antifreeze and other automotive fluids, motor oil and filters, car batteries, pesticides, pool chemicals and household cleaners. Items that are unacceptable are explosives, radioactive materials, tires, drums, ammunition and medical or business wastes.

There is a 20-gallon limit per item on paint, oil, gasoline, antifreeze and other automotive liquids. No single container may be larger than 5-gallons. All items should be in their original containers and must be clearly marked to identify their contents. For complete details, visit glendaleaz.com/sanitation and click on "hazardous materials."

Change of Residential Solid Waste Service for Some Customers

The city of Glendale is changing solid waste residential services for some areas that receive bulk trash and refuse collection in an alley. Those selected alleys will be transitioning to curbside service beginning January 1, 2022. The refuse 300-gallon-containers will be removed from the alleyway and a new non-shared, 90-gallon trash container will be delivered to the front of the affected homes for weekly service. Additionally, all bulk trash will be placed curbside for scheduled monthly service. This cost-effective service change will keep the alleys safer and cleaner. The city will do its best to transition alley service to curb service with minimal disruption to residents. All directly impacted households will receive more information prior to any changes. Every ten years, Glendale is required to redraw its city council districts based on data from the U.S. Census. The process is called redistricting, and the goal is to ensure each district has approximately equal population. Since the 2010 census, an additional 21,604 people call Glendale home. After a series of public meetings, your City Council adopted new council district boundaries for the city's six districts.

A Message from Vice Mayor Ian Hugh

The past year was record-breaking for growth in Glendale, and I am excited to share some of the highlights.

Thanks to the annexation of thousands of acres in the Loop 303 area, we have attracted new worldclass corporations. The 15 million square feet of development in this area brings new career opportunities to Glendale.

Near the Arrowhead corridor, we welcomed three additional luxury dealerships: Land Rover, Jaguar, and Volvo. Banner Health opened its first "Banner Health Center Plus," a \$65 million project. Phoenix Children's Hospital Arrowhead broke ground on a 225,000 square feet full-service hospital complex bringing an investment of nearly \$135 million to the City.

In Downtown Glendale, Brooklyn Bedding is near completion on their new headquarters around Bethany Home Rd and 51st Avenue. The 648,000 square foot facility will bring 400 jobs to Glendale.

The Sports and Entertainment District continues to be a driver for new businesses and residents. Over 5,000 single and multifamily housing units are being built. Under construction and soon to make a "splash" is the Crystal Lagoons Island Resort with three hotels, a 10-acre lagoon, and the first Mattel Adventure Park in the Country. Other exciting announcements include Tiger Woods' Pop Stroke mini-golf and Thirsty Lion Gastropub. Both are expected to break ground early this year.

Heading into 2022, we know that even more projects will be announced as businesses strive to be open by Super Bowl 2023. Once again, Glendale will be on the world's stage.
