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CITY OF GLENDALE STAFF, RESOURCES READY FOR STORMS

GLENDALE, Ariz. – The city of Glendale’s Emergency Operations, Water Services and Public Works teams are all closely monitoring the weather forecast with potential thunderstorms forecast by the National Weather Service tonight and through the week. “Storm preparedness has our full attention,” said City of Glendale Public Works Director Jack Friedline. “Department personnel are currently planning coordinated efforts to address any storm related emergencies citywide. Our staff is on standby and ready to respond through the duration of the storm and any potential aftermath.”

Staff is currently working on or completed:

- The city has ordered about 400 tons of sand, for use by both residents and city operations, along with 15,000 sand bags
- Barricades are on hand for staff to quickly set up traffic restrictions or closures if roads become impassable
- The Fire Department’s Emergency Operations Weather Watch Desk continues to monitor weather data through various sources, including the Phoenix National Weather Service, the National Weather Service radar images, NOAA weather radios, as well as the current rainfall/stream flow data from the Flood Control District of Maricopa County; staff is on stand-by to activate the Emergency Operations Center if necessary.

Traffic advisory for Tuesday evening’s One Direction concert at University of Phoenix Stadium:

- Drivers heading to the concert are advised to plan ahead, allow extra travel time, and utilize the pick-up/drop-off point if possible
- Pick-up/Drop-off point is accessible only from Glendale Avenue, heading southbound on 95th Avenue to Maryland
- Real-time traffic updates are available through Twitter – follow @GlendaleAZPD
- Non-concert attendees should avoid the area if possible

City officials are urging residents to prepare, in the event that heavy rain deluges the area again.

Important safety reminders:

- Children need constant supervision around all bodies of water.
- Avoid moving water.
- If your car stalls in rapidly rising waters, get out immediately and climb to higher ground. DO NOT attempt to push your car to higher ground as the ground underneath the surface may be unstable.
- Floodwaters often erode roads and walkways. Flood debris may also hide animals and broken bottles. Avoid walking or driving through it.

- If you must walk or drive in areas that have been flooded, stay on firm ground. Moving water only 6 inches deep can sweep you off your feet. Standing water may be electrically charged from underground or downed power lines.
